
The Statistical abstract is therefore a tool produced under the PNSD framework to provide reliable information to guide in policy formulation, planning, programming, monitoring and evaluation.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Police Statistical Abstract 2010 is the first of publication bringing together statistics produced and used in the Uganda Police. It will be an annual publication which will provide a statistical summary of data as collected and received by the different police units in the course of duty. This publication is divided into nine sections which are preceded by a glossary of definitions and a set of acronyms commonly used in the Uganda Police Force.

Section one presents a brief set up of the UPF;

- The Set Up of the UPF is such that it reflects both its Administrative and Specialized nature of its operations (activities). At the macro level, the force is organised into 11 directorates and 48 departments. At the territorial level, policing is organised into 18 regional, 122 district/divisional, 341 Stations and 1,578 police post commands.

Section two presents the human resource statistics as at December, 2010;

- Uganda Police Force had a total personnel strength of 42,634 of which 6,054 were female and 36,580 are male giving a ratio of about 1 to 8
- The majority of the personnel are below 25 years of age.
- The majority (51.4%) of the personnel strength has served less than 5 years.

In section three Traffic and Road Safety statistics of 2010 are discussed as highlighted;

- Total traffic accidents increased from 22,699 (2009) to 22,461 (2010) of which the majority were minor accidents with a percentage of 44
- 18,808 persons were involved in accidents- passengers and pedestrians accounting for the biggest percentage i.e. 37.8 and 29.1 respectively. 75% of the people involved were seriously injured.
- The majority of the accidents (54 percent) in the country occurred in the Kampala Metropolitan Area. 26% of all fatalities, 50.4% of the serious ones, and 65% of the minor accidents were in this region.
- In 2009, the Kampala- Jinja Highway registered the highest number of accidents (1281) with 21% fatal, 29% serious and 31% minor
- The total number of vehicles involved in crashes was 34,412. Motor cars formed the largest class with 11,818 (34.3%) involved in accidents.
- Road traffic accident death rates varied slightly from 9.1 per 100 000 population in 2009 to 9.3 per 100, 000 population in 2010.
- The Accident Severity Index reduced from 15 to 13 while the Accident fatality risk remained at 9

Section four presents statistics of Crime for the year 2010; below are the highlights

- The number of reports and complaints made to Police were 262,936 of which 99,917 were of criminal nature; an average of 273 offences being committed per day
- The Crime rate was 314; with property (145) and violent crime (92) rates the biggest contributors
- The Detection rate stood at 29% while the conviction rate stood at 19 %
- Detective workload stood at 23 for the 4345 detectives

Statistics on fire incidents and related hazards are discussed in section five and are highlighted;

- Kampala Metropolitan Area registered the highest number of fire incidents contributing over 70% to the total number of fires handled in the country
- 109 persons were recorded as fire victims with 58% of them registered dead.
- Majority of fire incidents occurred in residential premises at 42 percent, closely followed by business premises. Rubbish heaps and skips also constitute a significant number 9 percent

Section six discusses statistics related to child and family safety where the most common offences reported were domestic violence at 22.5 percent, defilement and general assault at 22.1 percent with South Eastern region registering the highest number of gender based offenses.

Statistics on personnel Welfare are presented in section seven including accommodation, health and sports.

On accommodation;

- The accommodation ratio stands at about 49 percent that is 2 families per dwelling unit
- Accommodation gap of 51 percent

On health;

- 86 health units are distributed in the 341 police stations, representing a 25 percent level of coverage
- 190 professional and support staff handled 458,738 cases of illness were handled internally
- The majority of persons examined were victims of assaults

Section eight presents statistics of the police marine unit where 107 incidents were registered; with 96 percent of these on Lake Victoria; bad weather was the major cause of accidents, 69 deaths registered while 52 lives were rescued

Section nine presents statistics on the Force's fleet.

- At the end of December, 2010 813 motor vehicles were in working condition
- 444 motor vehicles were distributed amongst the territorial police units
- 48% of the vehicle fleet use petrol engines
- The majority of the vehicle fleet (38%) are of the 3000-4500cc category

- The motor cycle fleet stood at 2,918, the majority of them (1,923) deployed in territorial police units

Data limitations

Uganda Police faces various data management challenges ranging from collection, dissemination, correlation, storage and coordination in data production and management. This is partly attributed to;

- a. Police statistics are produced as a routine and sometimes quality is not given due attention. Data producers and users need to be empowered to appreciate the importance of producing and using good statistics.
- b. Few well qualified, committed, motivated and well equipped staff to ensure compliancy to data standards at all level of policing; at least to police station level.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 POLICE UNITS

The Set Up of the UPF is such that it reflects both its Administrative and Specialized nature of its activities. At the macro level, policing functions were organised under eleven (11) directorates and forty-eight (48) departments, all under the direct supervision of the IGP.

At the micro level, the country is sub divided into territorial police administrative units of regional, district/divisional and police post command. The number of police units therefore continues to vary from time to time depending on the existing local government administrative units and localized policing challenges. All policing functions are implemented through these structures.

By October 2010, policing was administered through 18 regions, 122 district/divisional 341 police stations, and 1,578 police post commands. (Table 1.1.1)

2 HUMAN RESOURCE STATISTICS

These statistics are managed by the Directorate of Human Resource Management and Development which is mandated to plan and advise on human resource development and management strategies and policies for the UPF. They are compiled and are ready by the 15th of the following month from nominal rolls of all units.

2.1 Human Resource and ranks

By December 2010, total strength as per the staff list stood at 42,634 distributed among the various police ranks as indicated in Table 2.1.1; the ratio of women to men stood at about 1:8.

2.2 Personnel by age category

In terms of age distribution, the force is dominated by the age category 26-30 (22%) while the force average age is 34 years (Table 2.1.2). Average age by rank is similarly shown in Table 2.1.1 with PPCs having the lowest while AIGPs, SCPs, CPs, ACPs, SSPs, SPs, IPs, AIPs almost have the same average age.

2.4 Personnel deployment

In terms of distribution, 69.6% of the strength is deployed in territorial police units engaged in general policing, crime investigations and in operational field force units. Among the regions the strength is evenly distributed ranging between 3 and 9%. At 8.4% of the territorial strength, Eastern region had the biggest force while North Eastern and Central North Eastern regions have the lowest force deployment. (Table 2.1.4)

The rest of the force is deployed in police headquarters and specialized units at various deployments in the country. 7,435 (18%) were at the various police training Schools constituting both trainers and trainees, 1,746 (4%) were deployed with VIPPU with 3,748 (8%) attached to police headquarters and at the headquarters of specialized units. (Table 2.1.5; Appendix 1.2A)

The national police to population ratio stands at 1:770. However in district/divisions this ratio stood at an average of 1:1503 and it is unevenly distributed with Abim at 1:155 having the lowest ratio while Agago at 1:4,458 had the highest ratio. (Appendix Table 1.1A)

3 TRAFFIC AND ROAD SAFETY STATISTICS

These statistics are collected and disseminated by Uganda Police's Traffic and Road Safety department, which is mandated to ensure road safety through enforcement of traffic laws and regulations.

3.1 Traffic accidents by category

Total accidents in 2010 decreased by 1.5% compared to the previous year. This was attributed to an 8.3% decrease in minor accidents.

3.2 Monthly Accidents

December accounted for the highest number of accidents (2,045) while June had the lowest (1,732). Over the year accident levels fluctuated with slight variations before peaking in December. On average, 1872 accidents occurred per month which translated into 62 accidents daily.

3.3 Victims of road accidents

3.3.1 Victims by road user category

A total of 18,808 persons were involved in accidents out of which 2,754 (15.7%) died, 14,148 (75.2 %) were seriously injured and 1,706 (9.1%) were slightly injured. There was a 1.3 % reduction in the total number of casualties from 18563 in 2009 to 18,808 in 2010. Passengers and pedestrians account for the biggest number of victims at 38% and 29% respectively. Among the victims, 41.2% of victims who died in accidents were pedestrians

3.3.2 Victims of road accidents and gender

The majority of victims (67.8%) were male adults, a decline of about 6% from the previous year. 68% of all deaths registered were similarly male adults. Overall about 75% of all accidents victims were seriously injured, reflecting a 3% increase from the year 2009.

3.4 Causes of accidents

Human factors (careless driving, reckless driving, over speeding, over loading, careless pedestrian, under influence of drinks/drugs and passenger falling from vehicle) remained the major causes of accidents accounting for more than 80% of the reported accidents. (Table 3.1.3)

3.5 Distribution of accidents by region

The majority of accidents (54.1%) occurred in the Kampala Metropolitan Area, with 26.6% of all fatalities, 50.4% of all serious ones, and 65% of all minor accidents reported in the country. North East and Central North East regions registered the least number of accidents with less than 1% of all accidents reported that year

Kampala-Jinja highway registered the highest number of victims on major highways at 1654 people; 37% of all victims. At 23% of persons killed, Kampala-Jinja and Kampala-Gulu highways registered the highest number of deaths.

3.9 Enforcement

3.1.9 Express Penalty Scheme

The number of offending motorists instantly apprehended under this scheme almost doubled in 2010 from 102,643 of 2009. The payment default rate also increased from 12.9% to 43.4% despite the amount of revenue generated by the scheme increasing by about 40% from Shs 4.8bn to about Shs 6.8bn.

3.10 Inspectorate of vehicles (IOV)

This Unit is responsible for the inspection of accident vehicles taking note of damages, ascertaining their pre-accident conditions of vehicles and therein gives an expert opinion, inspection of vehicles suspected to be in a dangerous mechanical condition and testing of learner drivers and those seeking class extensions.

3.10.1 IOV Returns for the Period (Jan – Dec 2010)

3.10.1.1 Crash vehicle Inspection

During the period under review, a total of 16,892 accident vehicles were inspected countrywide. This is a 2.5% reduction from 2009. Of these 884 were found to be in a dangerous mechanical condition and 143 vehicles were written off for spares judging from the damages that were occasioned on these vehicles during the crashes. 91 % (15,293) of all accident vehicles inspected were privately owned and 4.1% (700) belonged to foreigners. 4 CRIME STATISTICS

These statistics are collected and disseminated by the Directorate of Criminal Investigations which is mandated to ensure effective investigations, detection, and prevention of crime. They are centrally collected from field units and disseminated by the headquarters at a monthly, half annual and annual basis.

4.1 Cases reported/received to/by police

In 2010, the number of reports and complaints made to Police were 262,936 of which 99,917 were of a criminal nature. In 2009, of the 282,401 reports received, 103,592 cases were of criminal nature, reflecting a 4% decrease in the number of criminal reports hence crime.

Of the criminal reports, 29,282 were taken to court, reflecting a detection rate of 29% a reduction of 7% from the previous year. 19% of which achieved convictions, about 1% acquitted, about 4% being dismissed. At the close of the year, about 76% of cases before court remained pending.

4.2 Categories of crime

Further break down of criminal reports revealed that offences against property remained the majority constituting about 38% of all criminal reports; this however a reduction of about 5% from the previous year. Assaults and gender based offences follow at 23% and 13% respectively. For both 2009 and 2010 thefts were the single most common offense reported. The year 2010 witnessed a 231% increase in the number of electoral offenses investigated compared to the previous year. Number of cases of corruption investigated also increased by 208%. There was however a 77% reduction in the number of corruption cases taken to court. Narcotics/Drugs related offenses were the most reduced cases investigated by about 57%.

In terms of detection, overall detection rate reduced from about 37% to 29%. Thefts and terrorism were the two crime categories where a significant increase in detection rate was registered. (Table 4.1.2)

4.3 Persons charged and convicted by court

Males and females differ in their offence rates and patterns; the majority of offenders (90%) are males. People officially held responsible for criminal offences in the year under review were much lower in number than the offences recorded. In 2010, 35,848 persons were charged with indictable offences, a small figure compared with the recorded crime total of 99,917. This variation being attributed to some offenders being charged with more than one offence, while for other offenders were yet to be apprehended. There was however an overall reduction of about 26% in the number of persons charged by court, with the offender rates by gender generally remaining the same in the different categories.

4.4 Convictions

Recorded offence data reveals that the rate of convictions for females in 2009 compared to 2008 was about 21%. Convictions for male juveniles similarly increased. Only 25% of male adults charged in courts of law were convicted. Overall, 26% of all persons charged in court were convicted; reflecting a 3% increase from the previous year. (Table 4.1.5)

Crime distribution indicates that crime rates are higher crime rates in more densely populated parts of the country. This is consistent with the differences one would expect according to sociological theories of crime causation. Kampala Metropolitan Area registered the highest crime incidences of all police districts (Table 4.1.5)

Whereas Katwe division remained the most crime prone policing area with a 44% increase in crimes reported, Jinja district registered the highest increase in crime reports with a 107% increase, compared with the previous year 2009. Wakiso, Iganga, and Masaka replaced Kabalagala, Mbarara and Kira Road on the list of the ten most crime prone districts. (Table 4.1.7)

Buliisa, Kaliro, Bukwo, Kabong, Namutumba, and Amuria were replaced from the list of the lowest ten crime areas implying an increase in crime levels in these districts beyond the 355 upper crime limit reported by Moroto. (Table 4.1.8)

It is clear that most of those districts with the highest crime levels include urban areas within their boundaries, while those with the lowest rates are predominantly rural in nature.

4.6 Common crimes

Common assaults (38%) and theft of mobile phones (22%) were the most common crimes increasing by 25% and 11% from the previous year's totals. Defilement remained the third most common crime with a 7% increase. Theft of motor cycles replaced theft of cash on the list of the six most common crimes.

Note: An obvious, but often overlooked, is the relationship between frequency and seriousness which is not straight forward. For example, fraud and forgery could appear in relatively small numbers. However if one were to measure the importance of property offences in terms of the value stolen, rather than number of incidents, fraud would come out as of greater significance than other categories by many times.

4.7 Crime and location

Comparison of crime data between rural and urban areas shows that more crimes were committed in rural areas (50.6%) than in urban areas (43.9%). A closer look at the distribution shows that the difference especially is attributed to a bigger number of gender based offences (rape, defilement), thefts, and assaults compared to urban areas.

4.8 Crime and value of property lost/recovered

Crime inflicts many costs on the victim or the general population including feelings of a lack of security and safety, the monetary value of property loss from criminal acts, lost earnings from injury or death, and the impact on property values. This section however presents the monetary value of property lost during 2010. Compiled data indicates a total loss due to crime of Ugx 103bn translating to a per capita loss of Ugx 3,065 for the population. (Population est. of 33,800,000)

Obtaining by false pretences, theft/robbery of motor vehicles, theft of cash, embezzlement and theft/robbery of motor cycles accounted for the largest proportion (over 62%)

In terms of recoveries, most property lost was not recovered thus translating into overall recovery rate of 19.4%. Receiving & retaining of stolen property (88%), recovery of fire arms (76.3%), cattle rustling (40%), theft of motor vehicles (34.7%), and obtaining by false pretences (31.6%) were some of the offenses where the recovery rate was more significant.

5 FIRE STATISTICS

These statistics are collected and disseminated by the Fire Brigade department which is mandated to coordinate all fire fighting, prevention and fire safety operations in the country. These statistics are compiled and updated upon occurrence of an incident and dissemination is on an annual basis.

5.1 Calls responded to

Actual fire incidents reported in 2010 reduced by about 4% compared to 2009. The percentage of actual calls handled reduced by about 8% while calls reporting electrical threats more than doubled. 7% of the call responded to turned out to be false. (Table 5.1.1)

6 CHILD AND FAMILY PROTECTION STATISTICS

These statistics are collected and disseminated by Child and Family Protection Unit under the Directorate of Community Affairs. The mandate of this unit is to create a friendly and enabling environment in which children and women's rights are recognized, respected and promoted. The following offence statistics, among others are collected by the Unit's 131 field units. Dissemination is on an annual basis.

The most common offences reported were: domestic violence (24%), defilement (21%), general assault and child neglect (20%). Eastern region registered the highest number of cases with 20% of all offenses reported. However, gender based offenses were generally evenly distributed across all regions ranging from 2-15% (Table 6.1.1)

Note that cases identified to be of criminal nature are then forwarded to the directorate of Criminal Investigations for further management

9 TRANSPORT STATISTICS

The Directorate of Logistics and engineering is mandated to develop plans, policies, strategies and guidelines for logistics and engineering support services for the UPF. The Force Transport Office is directly in charge of fleet management and supervision and daily collects statistics on fuel consumption, car breakdown, mileage, and vehicle allocation among others.

9.1 Police Fleet deployment

By the end 2010 police fleet stood at 813 motor vehicles and 2,918 motorcycles. 678 motor vehicles were classified to be in good working conditions, 444 were deployed in regional territorial police units with atleast a vehicle for every district/divisional police command. These are supplemented by the fleet managed centrally by the specialized units. 135 motor vehicles were deployed at the Force Transport Office for reasons including awaiting special duty, awaiting spares, or being grounded.

In terms of cubic capacity, the majority (38%) are of 3,000-4,500 cc diesel engine vehicles, although overall 48% of the vehicle fleet are petrol consumers. (Table 9.1.1)

The fleet also comprised of 2,918 motor cycles to supplement the vehicles. Most of these (1,923) are deployed in territorial police units, the rest being deployed in specialized units. 729 motor cycles were yet to be deployed by the relevant office.
